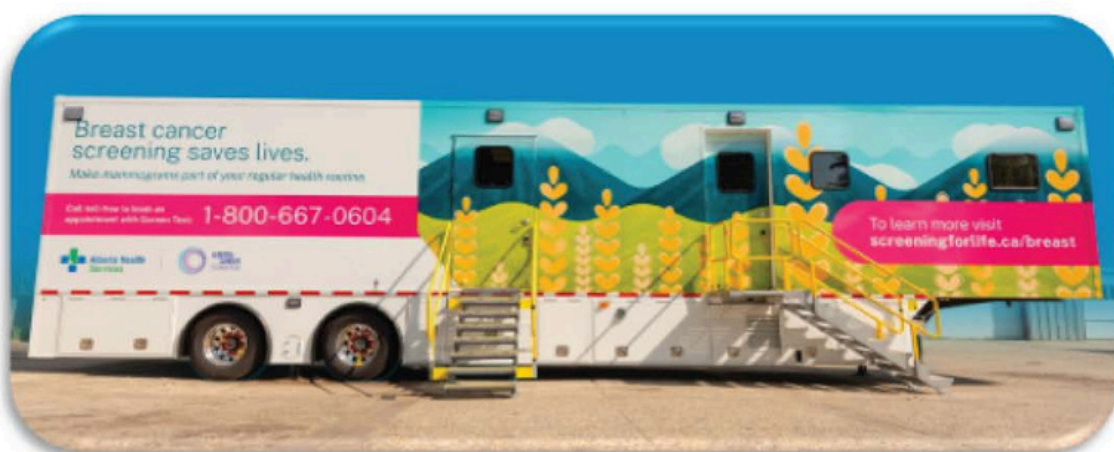

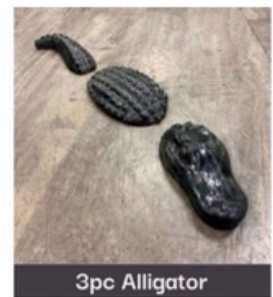

PUBLIC WORKS CORNER

In this month's newsletter we will talk about water meters and water consumption.

Water meters consist of two working parts:

1. **The Body** – this part contains a plastic or nylon impeller which is fastened to a magnet. As the flow of water moves through the meter, the impeller turns the magnet which registers the usage. Notice the word "flow;" when there is no flow, there is no spinning, therefore no usage. There must be flow through a meter for it to turn.
2. **The Electronic Head** – this part reads how much the magnet turns. If the magnet is not turning, the head cannot read usage.

Both parts are calibrated at the manufacturer, either they work, or they do not. Meaning, if a meter "fails" it will not spin, and therefore will have no "usage" to read. A meter cannot speed up on its own unless there is an increase in flow. The water can only be used on the customer side of the meter. A leak underground will not affect the meter reading, as the water has not passed the impeller/magnet.

So, what is high usage, or what can cause that?

The obvious culprits are leaky taps, leaky toilets, or leaking valves (yes even outside taps can leak and cause issues).



Other practices that can cause high usage on a meter reading are:

- Watering lawns and gardens, flowers, and trees
- Laundry or Washing dishes
- Washing equipment or vehicles
- Long showers or baths in hot sticky weather
- Filling kid's pools or cooling off a furry friend

All these practices can add up in a hurry and many times water is used but never mindfully recalled. Meters are read once a month, electronically, so the only time the town physically handles parts of a meter is if there is a "no read" in the software which triggers a need for a repair. If this occurs, a public works team member will contact you to arrange replacement of the malfunctioning parts.

It is very important to exercise your shut off valve once a year. Your shut off valve is usually located beside the meter. This is very important, as it enables you to shut the water off in your home while you are away, or should the meter need repairing, the water can be shut off and allow the repairs to be completed.

As we enter the fall season, a reminder to all customers whose meter is not inside, that you (as an owner) are required to ensure that heat traces are working, and the meters are properly insulated or heated. The "town" provides connection to the water source at the cc valve, which is located near the curb. The owner is responsible for water supply systems up to and including the meter. Damaged and frozen meters will be replaced; however, it will be at the owner's expense.

Dear Town of Hardisty Residents

I'm writing to you today out of deep concern—and hope—for the future of healthcare in Hardisty.

Recently, someone close to me needed to book a doctor's appointment here in town. To our surprise, they were unable to do so, as too much time had passed since their last visit and the clinic could no longer accept them as a patient. When I reached out to the clinic for more information, I was told something many may not realize: our sole physician is under immense pressure due to a heavy patient load, sole responsibility for our ER, and no recent access to locum or relief support. His physical and mental well-being are being stretched thin.

The reality is: without at least one more physician, it is not sustainable to offer the 24/7 emergency care that our town ideally needs.

Meanwhile, nearby communities are able to attract and retain multiple doctors. This raises the question: why not Hardisty?

As a member of the Flagstaff Healthcare Attraction & Retention Committee, I can say that while some support is available, it's limited in how directly it can address Hardisty's specific needs. It's become clear that a broader, community-driven effort is essential—not only to **retain our current doctor and clinic staff**, but to **attract additional professionals** and improve the work-life environment for everyone involved.

To better understand what might be possible, Brian Golka (Hardisty & District Development Group) and I visited Provost on August 21. We met with MD of Provost CAO Tyler Lawrason, Clinic Director & Healthcare Recruitment Lead Antoinette Erasmus, and long-time Reeve Allan Murray. Their success in healthcare retention and recruitment is remarkable—and they've generously offered to share their knowledge and assist us further.

Their model proves that success in healthcare attraction is possible—but it takes more than just a few passionate people. It requires a **whole-community approach**.

We identified several action steps we can begin working on immediately, but we need a committee to help lead and implement these efforts. We cannot afford to delay—our doctor's well-being, and our town's access to healthcare, depend on it.

I'd like to invite you to an upcoming **community meeting on September 17, 2025 at the Hardisty Community Hall** to begin this important conversation and shape a collective path forward.

This initiative is about more than just attracting physicians. It's about creating a culture of appreciation, sustainability, and community pride. A stronger healthcare system in Hardisty will positively impact every aspect of our town: business growth, family life, senior care, community development, and beyond.

We are reaching out to you as a valued member of the Hardisty community, asking you to consider joining this effort. We are proud of our town and what small-town life offers—and with that pride comes a responsibility to invest in what makes it thrive.

Please let us know if you are able to attend the meeting. Your voice, ideas, and support can help shape the future of healthcare in Hardisty.
